





Priest

Day after day and night after night, year after year your people, who were as many as the stars in the sky, waited patiently and prayed that the savior would come soon. Be with us now as we gather as witnesses to those prayers and the miracle of Christmas, the birth of your Son, our Savior, Jesus Christ, who with you and the Holy Spirit are one God, in Glory Everlasting. **Amen**.

The Story of Christmas

Children are invited to come down closer in front of the chancel steps.

This is the story of the birth of Jesus Christ, the Son of God, the Son of Mary.

For many years God's people thought about the words of Isaiah and the other prophets: "God wants you to live in peace and will give you the perfect king to rule over you. This king will come from King David's family and he will have great wisdom and knowledge." God's angels watched over the people as they waited.

Time passed and God decided it was time to send his son to the people. Mary was a woman who loved God, and she was soon to be married to a good man named Joseph. One night, an angel came to Mary.

Mary didn't know what to think. What could God's angel want with her?

But the angel said "Mary, do not be afraid! God loves you and is pleased with you. God has something for you to do."

"I am the Lord's servant," Mary said. "I will trust in God."

As Joseph slept, he was sent a message from God in a dream. He was chosen by God to love and care for Mary and the baby.

As the time came closer to the birth of Mary's baby, the ruler from Rome, Caesar Augustus, made a decree. "You must travel to your hometowns," Caesar Augustus said. "Everyone must be counted so that I will know how many people there are."

Mary and Joseph prepared to travel to Joseph's hometown of Bethlehem. On a clear, cold night,

And while Mary and Joseph were there in the stable, Mary's baby was born.

She wrapped the baby in soft cloths and laid him in a manger filled with fresh, clean hay. Joseph smiled and said, "His name is Jesus."

That same night there were shepherds watching over their flocks on the hillside. The shepherds could see stars twinkling in the sky over Bethlehem, but there was one star that was the brightest they had ever seen.

And then suddenly there was a great light, and the angels of the Lord appeared to them and said, "Don't be afraid! We bring you good news of great joy! 



Responding to the Story of Christmas

The priest says these or similar words

Just as the angels proclaimed the good news of Jesus' birth, we too proclaim the good news that guides us in all we do.

The priest and people together say

We believe in God, who made everything: the sun, the moon, stars in the sky; the earth, the seas, and the heavens above; all the creatures that swim and fly and crawl and run; and every human who loves and cries and laughs and sings.

We believe in Jesus, God's son, who loves us, who was born to Mary in a stable amidst the animals and was worshipped on that night by the angels and the shepherds.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, who is always with us helping us to love each other; a Spirit more powerful than any doubt or fear or darkness. **Amen.**

The Prayers of the People

The leader says

The shepherds heard the good news of Jesus' birth and rushed to see the baby who had come to save the world bringing their hopes and dreams and prayers. Rejoicing with Mary, the shepherds, and the entire world, let us also bring to Jesus our own hopes and dreams and prayers.

Jesus, you are the Son of God, and the Son of Mary, We pray for our families and all those we love,

That this Christmas would find them filled with your joy.

Jesus, at your birth you had no crib for a bed, We pray for the homeless, for migrants, and for refugees That you would embrace them with your love.



Celebrant The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ and the love of God and the fellowship of the

Holy Spirit be with you all.

People And also with you.

Celebrant Lift up your hearts.

Celebrant Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

People It is right to give God thanks and praise.

The Celebrant continues

Holy God, we gather together this day to offer you thanks and praise. You created all that is and gave us the very breath of life. From the beginning, you have called us into friendship with you, inviting us to know you and love you with all that we have and all that we are. Therefore we join our voices with the angels and archangels praising you and saying:

The Celebrant and people together

Holy, holy Lord, God of power and might,
Heaven and earth are full of your glory.
Hosanna in the highest.
Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.
Hosanna in the highest.

Father you created us to know you, yet we walked away from you and fell into sin, death, and evil. But you did not abandon us. Through the calling of Israel to be your people, through the giving of your law, through your word spoken through prophets you reminded us again and again of your great love for us. In the fullness of time to deliver us from the power of sin and death and to reveal the riches of your grace, you looked with favor on Mary, your willing servant, that she might conceive and bear a son, Jesus the holy child of God. Living among us, Jesus loved us. He broke bread with outcasts and sinners, healed the sick, and proclaimed good news to the poor. He yearned to draw all the world to himself yet we were heedless of his call to walk in love. Then, the time came for him to complete upon the cross the sacrifice of his life, and to be glorified by you.

At the following words concerning the bread, the Celebrant is to hold it or lay a hand upon it; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to be consecrated.

On the night before he died for us, Jesus was at table with his friends. He took bread, gave thanks to you, broke it, and gave it to them, and said: "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

As supper was ending, Jesus took the cup of wine. Again, he gave thanks to you, gave it to them, and said: "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Now gathered at your table, O God of all creation, and remembering Christ, crucified and risen, who was and is and is to come, we offer to you our gifts of bread and wine, and ourselves, a living sacrifice. Pour out your Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Body and Blood of Christ. Breathe your Spirit over the whole earth and make us your new creation, the Body of Christ given for the world you have made. In the fullness of time bring us, with the Blessed Virgin Mary, Joseph and all your saints, from every tribe and language and people and nation, to feast at the banquet prepared from the foundation of the world. Through Christ and with Christ and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, to you be honor, glory, and praise, for ever and ever. The Celebrant and people together say,

AMEN.

As our Savior Christ has taught us, we now pray

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

The Celebrant breaks the consecrated bread. A period of silence is kept. Then the Celebrant continues






