A Note on the Burial Service

The Burial of the Dead: Rite II is taken from the Episcopal Church's *Book of Common Prayer*, 1979. In the words of the *Book of Common Prayer*, this liturgy "finds all its meaning in the resurrection. Because Jesus was raised from the dead, we, too, shall be raised." Through anthems, prayers, and Scripture readings, we are invited to remember the promise of eternal life through Jesus Christ and the truth that "neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord," (Romans 8:38-39).

The service, then, is marked by a kind of somber joy. Though the departed is no longer with us, he is not gone but now finds himself in the nearer presence of our Lord. Today, we gather together to commend Tony's soul to the loving embrace of God. We grieve the loss of one we love but rejoice in the promise that one day we will see him again.

All you will need to participate fully in this service is found in this bulletin. Texts in *red italics* are rubrics, instructions that guide the priest and congregation in the actions of worship. Texts **in bold** are to be said by all those gathered.

The Opening Anthem and Collect

All stand while the following anthem is said by the Priest.

I am Resurrection and I am Life, says the Lord. Whoever has faith in me shall have life, even though they die.
And everyone who has life, and has committed themselves to me in faith, shall not die for ever.

As for me, I know that my Redeemer lives and that at the last he will stand upon the earth. After my awaking, he will raise me up; and in my body I shall see God. I myself shall see, and my eyes behold him who is my friend and not a stranger.

For none of us has life in himself, and none becomes his own master when he dies. For if we have life, we are alive in the Lord, and if we die, we die in the Lord. So, then, whether we live or die, we are the Lord's possession.

Happy from now on are those who die in the Lord! So it is, says the Spirit, for they rest from their labors.

The Priest offers the following prayer, first saying

The Lord be with you.

People And also with you.

Priest Let us pray.

O God of grace and glory, we remember before you this day our brother Tony. We thank you for giving him to us, his family and friends, to know and to love as a companion on our earthly pilgrimage. In your boundless compassion, console us who mourn. Give us faith to see in death the gate of eternal life, so that in quiet confidence we may continue our course on earth, until, by your call, we are reunited with those who have gone before; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

The First Lesson Wisdom 3: 1-5, 9

But the souls of the righteous are in the hand of God, and no torment will ever touch them.

In the eyes of the foolish they seemed to have died, and their departure was thought to be a disaster, and their going from us to be their destruction; but they are at peace.

For though in the sight of others they were punished, their hope is full of immortality.

Having been disciplined a little, they will receive great good, because God tested them and found them worthy of himself; Those who trust in him will understand truth, and the faithful will abide with him in love, because grace and mercy are upon his holy ones, and he watches over his elect.

The Second Lesson

1 Corinthians 15:20-26, 35-38, 42-44, 53-58

But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died. For since death came through a human being, the resurrection of the dead has also come through a human being; for as all die in Adam, so all will be made alive in Christ. But each in his own order: Christ the first fruits, then at his coming those who belong to Christ. Then comes the end, when he hands over the kingdom to God the Father, after he has destroyed every ruler and every authority and power. For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. The last enemy to be destroyed is death. But someone will ask, "How are the dead raised? With what kind of body do they come?" Fool! What you sow does not come to life unless it dies. And as for what you sow, you do not sow the body that is to be, but a bare seed, perhaps of wheat or of some other grain. But God gives it a body as he has chosen, and to each kind of seed its own body. So it is with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable, what is raised is imperishable. It is sown in dishonor, it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness, it is raised in power. It is sown a physical body, it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a physical body, there is also a spiritual body. For this perishable body must put on imperishability, and this mortal body must put on immortality. When this perishable body puts on imperishability, and this mortal body puts on immortality, then the saying that is written will be fulfilled:

[&]quot;Death has been swallowed up in victory."

"Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?"

The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. Therefore, my beloved, be steadfast, immovable, always excelling in the work of the Lord, because you know that in the Lord your labor is not in vain.

Reader The Word of the Lord. People **Thanks be to God.**

The Holy Gospel

John 11:21-27

All stand as able for the proclamation of the Gospel.

Priest The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John. *People* **Glory to you, Lord Christ.**

Martha said to Jesus, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died. But even now I know that God will give you whatever you ask of him." Jesus said to her, "Your brother will rise again." Martha said to him, "I know that he will rise again in the resurrection on the last day." Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" She said to him, "Yes, Lord, I believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, the one coming into the world."

Priest The Gospel of the Lord.
People Praise to you, Lord Christ.

The Homily

All sit.

The Apostle's Creed

All stand as able. The priest says,

In the assurance of eternal life given at Baptism, let us proclaim our faith and say,

Priest and People together say

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord.

He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary.

He suffered under Pontius Pilate,
 was crucified, died, and was buried.

He descended to the dead.

On the third day he rose again.

He ascended into heaven,
 and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit,
 the holy catholic Church,
 the communion of saints,
 the forgiveness of sins,
 the resurrection of the body,
 and the life everlasting. Amen.

The Prayers

The following prayers and intercessions are offered by those gathered, the Priest first saying,

For our brother Tony, let us pray to our Lord Jesus Christ who said, "I am Resurrection and I am Life."

Lord, you consoled Martha and Mary in their distress; draw near to us who mourn for Tony, and dry the tears of those who weep. **Hear us, Lord.**

You wept at the grave of Lazarus, your friend; comfort us in our sorrow. **Hear us, Lord.**

You raised the dead to life; give to our brother eternal life. Hear us, Lord.

You promised paradise to the thief who repented; bring our brother to the joys of heaven. **Hear us, Lord.**

Our brother was washed in Baptism and anointed with the Holy Spirit; give him fellowship with all your saints. **Hear us, Lord.**

He was nourished with your Body and Blood; grant him a place at the table in your heavenly kingdom. **Hear us, Lord.**

Comfort us in our sorrows at the death of our brother; let our faith be our consolation, and eternal life our hope. **Hear us, Lord.**

Silence may be kept.

The Priest concludes with the following prayer.

Father of all, we pray to you for Tony, and for all those whom we love but see no longer. Grant to them eternal rest. Let light perpetual shine upon them. May Tony's soul and the souls of all the departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. **Amen.**




The Priest proceeds

For to your faithful people, O Lord, life is changed, not ended; and when our mortal body lies in death, there is prepared for us a dwelling place eternal in the

heavens.

Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:



The people stand or kneel. The Priest continues

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me." After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given

thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me." Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Priest and People

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

The Priest continues

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts. Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **AMEN**.

The Priest then continues

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,


People and Priest

Just A Closer Walk With Thee


Just a closer walk with Thee, Grant it, Jesus, is my plea, Daily walking close to Thee, Let it be, dear Lord, let it be.

THE COMMENDATION

Give rest, O Christ, to your servant with your saints, where sorrow and pain are no more, neither sighing, but life everlasting.

You only are immortal, the creator and maker of mankind; and we are mortal, formed of the earth, and to earth shall we return. For so did you ordain when you created me, saying, "You are dust, and to dust you shall return." All of us go down to the dust; yet even at the grave we make our song: Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia.

Give rest, O Christ, to your servant with your saints, where sorrow and pain are no more, neither sighing, but life everlasting.

Into your hands, O merciful Savior, we commend your servant, Tony. Acknowledge, we humbly beseech you, a sheep of your own fold, a lamb of your own flock, a sinner of your own redeeming. Anthony David Pryor June 27, 1949 – April 9, 2023



Anthony David Pryor (Tony), 73, was born in Waco, TX on June 27,1949 to parents Lindley Brazelton Pryor and Marjorie Lee Bielstein.

He attended Memorial High School for two years and played in the Interns, an awesome band in Houston who opened for The Animals, Herman's Hermits, The Byrds, and others at the Houston Coliseum and had a top ten single (Sally Met Molly in Birmingham) on the KLIF chart.

His senior year, he attended high school at Saint Martin's Episcopal School in New Orleans before he was off to Baylor University. At Baylor, he got both his undergraduate and law degrees. During his Baylor years, Tony was president of the Kappa Omega Tau fraternity. He also played in The Oxford Circus and BT and Company bands.

Tony was accomplished on the keyboard and the piano. Tony practiced law at Tenneco, but music called to him. For a time, he played the piano at the Ritz Carlton. He went to work for Enron and was there when the company collapsed. Not long before, he met his future husband, Greg, at a Men's Retreat at Margaret Austin Center and their lives became forever intertwined.

Soon after Enron fell, he embarked on a new adventure and became a voice coach to help promote self-healing through singing by founding his Living Your Voice classes and workshops. He also found time for several church ministries including Heartscape at Palmer Episcopal Church and he did the music and played the keyboard at Rhythms of Grace, a special needs service at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church until he passed. Tony leaves behind a trail of music, humor, kindness, and love.

Tony is survived by his husband, James Gregory Chapman (Greg), his brother, Barry Pryor, and his sister, Marsha Cannonie.
